

Do you or a family member have lived experience in human trafficking or the sex trade?

If yes, we invite you to participate in a research interview or focus group.

The purpose of the interview/focus group is to discuss indicators and experiences of human trafficking and what services need to be available to persons who are being trafficked.

All participants will receive a \$40 honorarium for their time.

Interview option: The individual interview will take approximately 1 hour at a date and time of your choosing (telephone, Skype, or in person).

Focus group option: If enough people are interested in having a focus group, it will take approximately 2 hours, with snacks and parking/bus fare provided.

Upcoming Webinars for Education and Awareness

In the fall of 2017, we held 8 workshops across the northeast region to identify gaps and barriers to service provisions for trafficked persons. In the fall of 2018, we held three follow-up conferences in Timmins, Sudbury and Sault Ste Marie (SSM in partnership with HOPE Alliance and the PACT grandmothers) in order to share our results, get further feedback, and provide education including by having survivors of human trafficking share their experiences.

NORAHT is currently working toward the next steps of our participatory action research: the “output” phase where we create toolkits and other resources. Participants at our workshops and conferences clearly identified the need for education, collaboration, culturally-specific resources, and the inclusion of lived experience.

We have decided that **webinars** are a cost-effective and relatively accessible mode of delivery. Based on our research and your input, the members of NORAHT have brainstormed some ideas for what we think would be beneficial topics of conversation for the upcoming webinars:

- Trauma-informed responses to human trafficking
- Sex work informed responses to human trafficking
- Strategies for collaboration
- Harm reduction and human trafficking
- MMIWG2S and human trafficking
- Structural drivers of human trafficking

We aim to include voices of lived experience in the production of these webinars and to engage decolonial and Indigenist perspectives throughout.
